ETHIOPIA

t is amazing to see how far Sasiga Mid-Highlands has come! They're planning their "graduation" from FH partnership for near the end of 2024. In spite of being impacted by a civil conflict from the north, FH staff see the resilience and worldview of families in the Mid-Highlands becoming distinctly more hopeful, confident, and determined to support their communities' development.

One of the strongest signs of resilience in a community is when they take initiative to care for their own—for those who are vulnerable or suffering or just need a helping hand. We see this happening all over. For example, this year, when FH staff members pointed out the widows and elderly in the communities who needed support, church leaders stepped into action. They organized community members to mobilize resources and put in the sweat equity to help them make repairs on their homes, like fixing leaky roofs. In addition, on a community visit, FH staff found young people bolstering the inter-community roads so they could be used by motor vehicles. While the youth have received volunteerism training from FH, this initiative was totally their own!

Families are also successfully working on boosting food security. They've dramatically improved the soil in the Mid-Highlands by planting trees and practicing agroforestry. By continuing to train farmers on the community-owned tree nursery, FH helps families grow tree seedlings for their farms to support healthy soil and prevent deforestation. They also make money by selling seedlings to the community. This improves livelihoods and food security in a sustainable way.



IMPACT STORY

Child Sponsorship Gives Desta New Hope

Fourteen-year-old Desta has benefited from the child sponsorship program—from school uniforms and stationary to receiving a goat when he was just eight years old. He has since raised a small flock of goats, which have made a huge difference for his once struggling family.

Before partnership with FH, their rural farming community in Sasiga battled termite infestations, fall armyworms, and high soil acidity, making it hard to grow crops. Spiritually, emotionally, and socially, Desta's family longed for more. But they were in survival mode.

Desta was often kept home to help with chores instead of going to school. Even worse, there wasn't enough food. Desta admits, "I feel angry as I recall some of the events that happened in my life. There was a time of starvation when I went to school with no food."

Goats and coffee help Desta overcome

Through the child sponsorship program, Desta's family attended workshops that helped them tackle their challenges and increase farm production. They started receiving FH Gift Guide gifts like tree seedlings, garden tools, and vegetable seeds. And they worked—their harvest multiplied five times!

Today, his family earns an income by selling crops, milk, honey, vegetables, and even coffee. This diversified income stabilized the family—they now have enough to eat and prioritize Desta's education. "After I became a sponsor child I became active in my learning. My family gave attention to our education and supported me," Desta explains.

Desta's goat was also a big help: "I sold the [goat] offspring and purchased a 0.25 hectare coffee farm. Part-time, I manage my coffee farm as well as the goat," Desta says smiling. Child Sponsorship and FH partnership radically changed Desta's childhood and are shaping him into a young man with hopes and skills for the future. "I am very pleased about my life!" he says.

Nano Sanbata Dure had a shortage of clean water, making families— especially children!—sick. It affected the health and economy of the entire community. But since families started drinking from a newly rehabilitated capped spring, waterborne diseases have dramatically decreased! The money they used to spend on medicine can now be used to feed their families and send their children to school.
