B wira began their partnership with FH just two short years ago, and yet so much has already been accomplished! The communities in Bwira faced serious challenges with almost half of their children suffering from stunting, meaning their physical growth and mental development are impaired from poor nutrition and repeated infections. Parents needed support to multiply their harvests and grow new livelihoods so they could start providing better health and education for their children.

After two years, the communities of Bwira boast 75 active Savings and Loans groups with 2,129 members! So far, they've saved over \$6,000 CAD and distributed loans to support the education, health, and livelihoods of their members' families. In 2023 alone, 120 savings group leaders were trained on group management and record keeping, and another 180 individuals were trained on entrepreneurship skills and business development.

Since the beginning of their partnership with FH, Bwira has established over 1,750 family gardens to grow nutritious food that will sustainably combat child malnutrition. As families are introduced to growing new vegetables they're also learning tasty, culturally appropriate recipes to incorporate these new foods into their family meals. These small ways of changing family culture and behaviours have a huge impact that lasts for generations.

Further advancements in the fight against poverty were made this year in the areas of agriculture, education, clean water, church training, leadership development, and more! We're grateful for an amazing year with Bwira and are excited for the year to come.

From washed out to thriving

Dreams washed away

Jean farms for a living, but it isn't easy. The soil in the community of Ruhindage is acidic and the hilly landscape causes crops to wash away when it rains. And does it ever rain! Often resulting in dangerous landslides. "Fifty per cent of my crops were ruined by heavy rain," Jean explains. "The harvest was low."

Jean couldn't provide everything his family needed and often left his community to look for work. Sometimes his children missed school waiting for their father to get casual work so he could pay for their school fees and supplies. Without water access close to home, the kids had to spend an hour fetching water in the morning before school and again in the evening, adding yet another barrier to their education.

"Emotionally, neither myself nor my wife was happy, and we felt guilty before our children."

New dreams planted

Through FH partnership, life in Ruhindage began to change. Jean took agricultural workshops, learning how to make compost and increase harvests. "By putting into practice the knowledge we got, our yield has increased and there is no hunger!" Jean exclaims.

A brand new FH-funded water pipeline also created new opportunities. "I can now irrigate

my crops during the dry season which I had never done before," Jean explains. "I decided to extend my agricultural activities. I irrigated my field, planted tree tomatoes, and used manure to fertilize them. I started out planting just 100, but today, I've increased to 400 trees." With the money he earned by helping with the pipeline construction, Jean bought a cow to provide sufficient manure for fertilizer, milk, and additional income.

Jean also joined a Savings and Loans group where he saves money and accesses loans to cover family needs, including school fees. "I am happy that my children are regularly attending school [and] today, our children are healthy due to the nutritious food we eat."

With all these positive changes, Jean's relationships are improving. "I have good collaboration with my wife," he shares. "We are happy today and have committed to work together for the better future of our children."
